Green Lawn Basics

Description:

 General lawn care and gardening practices that promote less maintenance and a cleaner environment.

Tip Sheet #2

Functions/Benefits:

- Water conservation
- Improves water quality reaching the stream
- Saves money
- Reuse of household and yard organic material (compost is free fertilizer)

Recommendations:

References for recommendations are provided on following page.

- Use fertilizers sparingly or switch to organic alternatives entirely.
- Test your soil to see if you need supplements before you apply them.
- Ask a local native plant nursery or your Penn State Cooperative Extension for advice.
- Never apply fertilizer or chemicals before a rain storm. It will wash away.
- Compost (use your own leaf litter, lawn clippings and kitchen scraps to make a high quality soil amendment).
- Learn about good vs. bad insects (many insects are important to the life cycle of our native plants).
- Remove invasive plants and replace with native species.
- Water wisely. When the right plant is selected for the right conditions you may not need to water at all or only 1-2 times per month.
- Water in the morning for less evaporation.
- Use a soaker hose to water directly into the soil.
- Use a rain barrel to water your plants.
